Remembering Hal Roach – "The King of Comedy"

One of Culver City's lost landmarks was the Hal Roach Studios, originally located at 8822 West Washington Blvd. (at the corner of Washington & National Blvd.) In 1980 the site was marked with a historical plaque as one of the City's most famous and important studios.

The Hal Roach Company was formed in 1914 and had leased several studio sites in the Los Angeles area until finally settling in Culver City. The original name for Roach's company was "Rolin", named after Hal Roach and financial backer Dan Linthicum.

After a couple of company closures, Roach's friend, comedian Harold Lloyd, became the fledging studios lead actor, ensuring the small company's success.

In 1920, Hal Roach formed a new company called "Hal Roach studios" and a new era began. At this time, Harold Lloyd, Charley Chase and Snub Pollard were among the top stars of the company.

By April 1920, the studio consisted of the administration building on Washington Blvd., one large open stage, an enclosed stage, a set storage building, a laboratory and department bungalows. There was a back lot with various types of sets that were used over and over again. By May, there was

a "pool" water tank installed and some other departmental buildings.

In January of 1922, actress Ruth Roland was making Roach "serial chapter plays" while a new concrete stage was being built. In September, the first of "Our Gang" comedies was produced

and by 1923, famed vaudevillian Will Rogers was signed to star in a series of comedies.

Throughout the 1920's such stars as Laurel and Hardy, Charley Chase, Will Rogers, Max Davidson, Snub Pollard, and Our Gang dominated the Roach output, along with Harold Lloyd until he left the company in 1924.


In May of 1923, Hal Roach purchased a 10-acre ranch near the studio at what is now Robertson Blvd, where he shot films on "location".

Hal Roach employed a variety of 'actors', including the star of one of his films: The Devil Horse (1926) starring Rex "The Wonder Horse". And it was in September of 1926 that Laurel and Hardy were officially teamed for the film, Duck Soup.

By January 1927, all Roach productions were distributed by MGM Studios, making the Hal Roach Studio the comedy unit of MGM. With the coming of sound

pictures, the Hal Roach Company was in the forefront of sound technology and all Roach filmed became 'sound' pictures, made in newly constructed 'sound' stages.

One hundred and four years ago The HAL ROACH COMEDY COMPANY opened a studio at Washington and National Boulevards. This studio was known as "The Lot that Laughter Built" where such screen icons as Harold Lloyd, Our Gang, Laurel and Hardy, Charlie Chase and other comedy stars made Culver City their home. The Roach studio opened in 1920 and closed in 1959 almost a forty-year run as one of the most successful comedy studios in film history. During WWII the studio was converted into a military facility from 1943-1948 making training films. After the war, the studio entered the world of Television. The overall mission for Roach was to nurture talent and its star players, that spent the prime of their careers on this Culver Lot. The Roach Studios turned out genuinely original material such as the screwball classic Topper (1937), and the serious story Of Mice and Men (1940), followed by One Million B.C. (1940). 



REMEMBERING HAL ROACH (CONT.)

The 1930's was the golden era for the Roach Studios with a star line-up that included some of the most popular comedians around: Laurel and Hardy, Charley Chase, Our Gang, Harry Langdon, Thelma Todd, Patsy Kelly and Zasu Pitts.

In 1937, Roach began producing "A" class feature films, the first being the classic Topper, starring Constance Bennett and Carey Grant. By the end if the 1930's, Roach had produced such films as: Zenobia starring Oliver Hardy, Captain Fury with June Lang, Of Mice and Men starring Burgess Meredith and Lon Chaney Jr., and the Housekeeper's daughter with Joan Bennett.

The Roach Studios continued making feature films into the 1940's until the Army-Air Force took over the entire lot, nicknaming it "Fort Roach. Here, training and propaganda films were made by many of the popular set, including a popular young actor named Ronald Reagan.

Following the war, the Roach Studio resumed its feature film production activity with the construction of new stages and facilities. Other production companies also located on the lot. Hal Roach Jr. led the company into television production, over seeing such productions as Life with Father – The Stu Erwin Show, My Little Margie, Rocket Squad, Amos 'N' Andy, Screen Directors Playhouse, Blondie, Abbott and Castello and The Lone Ranger.

In April of 1959, the Hal Roach Studios was closed due to bankruptcy. Hal Sr. came back to try to get the studio rolling again, but by December of 1962, the studio was permanently closed. In August 1963, the studio was finally demolished after several auctions and sales of the company's assets.

Though Hal Roach Sr. would live to see his 100th birthday, the final demise of his "Laugh Factory" was truly the end of a remarkable era of film history.

Pedro Gonzalez (May 24, 1925 – February 6, 2006)


Pedro, his wife Leandra (of nearly 64 years) and their three children were longtime Culver City Residents.

Upon seeing Pedro's highly amusing appearance on Groucho Marx's "You Bet Your Life" John Wayne signed Pedro to a contract with his production company. Pedro appeared alongside the Duke in such films as Wings of the Hawk, The High and the Mighty, The Wings of Eagles, Rio Bravo, McLintock!, Hellfighters and Chisum.

Pedro became one of the era's few recognized Mexican Americans on the big screen and television and influenced stars like Cheech Marin and Cuba Gooding Jr. to pursue careers in acting. Mayor Richard Riordan awarded Pedro with a Certificate of Appreciation for the Latinos in Hollywood. He was also posthumously awarded a very well-deserved Star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.


"Los Angeles is a city that runs from its own past" explains Historian and Bison Archives owner Marc Wanamaker. Many of Hollywood's legendary sets and props, mansions, theaters, restaurants, nightclubs, hotels, and even the studios and the films they produced are now either gone or have been redeveloped, repurposed, or remade beyond recognition. Even more disarmingly, the physical ephemera associated with such items is often MIA as well. Photographs, files, maps, documents, menus, production paperwork, records, manuscripts, everything from matchbooks to movie magazines, and entire movie backlots have now been lost in the backwash of dubious progress, short-sighted corporate mindsets, and civic indifference. Fortunately, for the last fifty years, in the very epicenter of Hollywood, thanks to Wanamaker, there has existed a haven where over 70,000 of these items, physically or photographically, have been collected and protected. These artifacts tell the story of Hollywood's glorious past, as well as its uncertain future as the hub of filmmaking in America.
