Barbecue Sauce Lost by Ryan Vincent

With Labor Day having signaled the unofficial end of barbeque season, we wanted to take a look back at much loved and much missed Stern's Famous Barbecue. Located at 12658 West Washington Blvd., Stern's attracted fans from far and wide. Opened in 1922 by Isidor Stern, a Texas butcher, Stern's eventually included a 32room motel as part of the operation. Isidor's nephew, Hal, was the last owner before a 1983 fire lead to the restaurant's closure. Though the restaurant could have been rebuilt, their kitchen setup was grandfathered in, and updated fire codes meant the recipes couldn't be replicated. Hal Stern moved to Flagstaff, Arizona, where he became a real estate broker and horseman.

Stern's barbecue sauce is the legend that lingers, which many recall as being brown-orange instead of the usual red color, served hot with meaty bits. Many have speculated that the sauce contained XLNT chili con carne. Or maybe there was Coca-Cola? Possibly mustard?

Users of roadfood.com were able to contact Hal Stern in an attempt to get the recipe. The secret, according to Hal, were drippings and trimmings from the meat that were ground up and added to the sauce. He was reluctant to divulge the list of other ingredients, but also stated that, since their barbecued meat was included in the sauce, it is impossible to replicate in any case.

While Stern's Famous Barbecue is long gone, Culver City's barbecue tradition lives on. Outdoor Grill, celebrating its twentieth year in operation, opened just down Washington Blvd. from where Stern's was located, Santa Maria Barbecue has been going strong for over a decade, and over the past year both Holy Cow BBQ and Maple Block Meat Co. opened on

The Culver City Historical Society will present a special multi-faceted program featuring the care and display of Culver City's MGM costume collection by Denice Renteria, Costumes Chair, and Sharon Shore, past Costumes Chair, plus a presentation by Louise Coffey-Webb, former Society President.

Renteria, a prop master for Knott's Berry Farm, and Shore, an internationally and nationally known conservator of textiles, will begin with a visual presentation and discussion about the costume collection held in the Archives and Resource Center (ARC), and will show several costumes. 

Walk with a Doc

As you may be aware, "Walk with a Doc" started in Columbus, Ohio, and we are privileged to have an active program in Culver City thanks to Vice Mayor Jeff Cooper, Jeffrey Penso, MD, Sarah Carpenter, MD, and Grace Elliot. The walks have

traditionally taken place on the third Saturday of the month, from Veterans Memorial Park. After a warm-up with Brandon Webb, and pertinent info from one of the "Docs," participants enjoy the suggested route at their own pace.

The Culver City Historical Society's first partnering with this program was designed to thank organizer Grace, and ended with a tour of the Historical Society Archives. "Doc" Penso, a member of the Historical Society, has encouraged partnerships with other walks (expanded walks that focused on local points along the local route from Veterans Park, and others through Downtown Culver City, The Culver Studios, and the Helms District). In honor of our Centennial, our Culver City Historical Society will partner again to offer a unique historic perspective to selected tours during this celebratory year.

October 15, 2016, at 8:45AM, Downtown Culver City will be the first of these informative exercises!

As your city historian and founding member of the Society, I am pleased to act as your tour guide. We will begin this Centennial walk from City Hall through Downtown. (Complimentary parking is available under City Hall). Culver City Historical Society docents will be stationed along the route to offer insight into some of the historic sites along the way. For example, past president Stu Freeman will be stationed at the Akasha restaurant entrance of the Hull Building.


