I remember roller skating to work at Hot Dog on a Stick in the Fisherman's Village and laugh when I think about skating in that yellow, blue and red striped uniform. I always shoved the embarrassing hat in my pack. I miss the lemonade.

Hot Dog on a Stick isn't there anymore, but El Torito still is! So, I treated myself to a different kind of lemonade, a margarita, and watched the boats. From here, you can catch a glimpse of Mother's Beach, the spot where most of the kids from around here learned to swim.

I had one more stop in mind so I forced myself to get back on that hard bike seat and pedal in the opposite direction.

Passing Sepulveda, I imagined the smell of hamburgers. In the old days

you could hang a right for Bob's Big Boy. Further, there's a bridge that connects you to Lindberg Park where the kids used to play on a big green (monster) slide.

The Ballona Creek was one of the borders to Desilu Studios. I stopped here for a memory and smile. I remember in 1974, before the bike path was even here, my friend Donnie and I climbed into Desilu from right here (see photo), disregarding the "Dogs on Duty" signs. Well, he disregarded them—it was pretty much on my mind the entire time. We explored Gomer Pyle's camp and the Hogan's Heroes set. I wonder how many teenagers can say they went on a "date" in Stalag 13?

What a beautiful bike path. I pondered the thought of continuing to Syd Kronenthal Park, which we just called McManus Park back in the day, but that trek would have proven a

bit ambitious for this old gal. I decided to leave it for next time, after I invest in some padded bicycle shorts!



The first official use of the historic movie backdrops obtained by the Culver City Historical Society from the Motion Picture Art Directors Guild occurred this past summer in a very public manner.

Musical theater workshops are held year-round at Vets Auditorium by dee-Lightful Productions, Culver City's own theater education program for kids ages 7-17. Involving weeks of work, two plays were presented last summer, presented to large public audiences who very likely had not experienced live performance in several months due to the pandemic.

The season's inaugural production, "Honk!," enjoyed added production value when it was performed in front of the Historical Society's 30-foot landscape backdrop.

Dolores Aguanno, program director of dee-Lightful Productions, produces the workshops. She was overjoyed at the enhancement to their stage setting and noted that the visual quality of the backdrop made all the kids more enthusiastic about the show.
