# From the Archives: The Gabrielinos (Fall 1997)

The Gabrielinos extinct? Don't you believe it! Contrary to published reports in several books and articles, the Gabrielinos or Tongvas, their original name, are alive and well all over Southern California and beyond. In my limb of the family tree alone there are 31 direct descendants and more coming. Multiply that by the other nine families in the branch and you can easily come up with over 300 -- and that's only from one branch.

Tongva means "people of the earth." The name Gabrielino was given to them by the Spaniards to identify them with the San Gabriel Mission, which they helped to build.

The ancestral tribal territory encompassed the entire Los Angeles basin and parts of Orange County, from the San Bernardino and San Gabriel mountains to the Pacific Ocean, from south of the Santa Monica Mountains to Aliso Creek in Orange County. They also occupied three of the Channel Islands as well as Santa Catalina, San Clemente, and San Nicolas and made excursions to Santa Barbara Island.

The Gabrielinos/Tongvas were the original inhabitants of Culver City, which is in an area then known as Saa Angna ("ngna" was a common ending for village names; the last "n" being dropped later as in Topanga, Tujunga, and Cahuenga).

There are several groups who are actively teaching and publishing the culture and history of our people. One such group is the Gabrielino/Tongva Springs Foundation at University High School, site of the Tongva Village of Kuruvungna.

There is a group in Catalina called the Ti-At Society, after the plank boats our ancestors used to paddle from the mainland to the islands. There is the Gabrielino/ Tongva Tribal Council in San Gabriel, and the Mother Earth Clan in Riverside. There are also groups in Baldwin Park and Orange County. All these groups are dedicated to educating the public about our people, especially teaching the children about our history and culture.

We are far from extinct. We have been here for centuries and will be for centuries to come.

# October 18, 2022 - General Meeting and Program The 1976 Explosion That Changed Everything Multipurpose Room, Veterans Memorial Building, 7PM

On June 16, 1976, a gas line exploded at the corner of Venice Boulevard and Bagley Avenue. The fire shot up hundreds of feet and dozens of fire trucks were brought in from the city of Los Angeles to help the local Culver City Fire Department. As fire inspector Jim Forte recalls, the fire was so hot that it "melted the plastic on the fire engine." The explosion resulted in nine deaths, 26 hospitalizations, and 14 critically injured, as well as millions of dollars in property damage...all due to an "18-inch utility location error." This tragic event resulted in the creation of a national toll-free number 811, which people can now call before digging in any area. Please join us for this powerful program in

which we will show the short documentary "811" produced by Mark Morris followed by a Q&A with fire inspector Jim Forte and photographer Brian Haimer who were there on this historic day. We will then have a visit from the Culver City Fire Department, which is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year.
