LANDMARK TOURS...CONTINUED:

- #580 Well "ALAMITOS 1", Hill & Temple, Los Angeles. One of the world's most famous wells. Started on March 23, 1921, it flowed 590 barrels of oil a day when it was completed June 25, 1921, at a depth of 3,114 feet. This discovery well led to the development of one of the most productive oil fields in the world and helped to establish California as a major oil producing state.
- #822 FIRST JEWISH SITE IN LOS ANGELES. Near Lilac Terrace and Lookout Drive, Chavez Ravine, Los Angeles. The Hebrew Benevolent
  Society of Los Angeles (1854), first charitable organization in
  the city, acquired this site from the city council by deed of
  April 9, 1855. This purchase of a sacred burial ground represented the first organized community effort by the pioneer
  Jewish settlers.
- #871 THE GAMBLE HOUSE, 4 Westmoreland Place, Pasadena. Built in 1908, the David B. Gamble House is a tribute to the genius of architects Charles Sumner Greene and Henry Mather Greene. Its design represents a unique California lifestyle and is a master-piece of American craftsmanship. In 1966 it was made a gift by the Gamble family to the City of Pasadena in a Joint agreement with the University of Southern California.
- #887 PASADENA PLAYHOUSE, 39 El Molino Ave., Pasadena. Founded in 1917 by Gilmor Brown, the Playhouse was designed by architect Elmer Grey and the cornerstone laid May 31, 1924. In 1928 the College of Theatre Arts was incorporated with the Pasadena Playhouse Association as a non-profit institution. In 1937, the Playhouse received the honorayr title "State Theatre of California" from the California Legislature.
- #302 OLD MILL, 1120 Old Mill Rd., San Marino. The old mill, El Molino Viejo, was designed by Fatehr Jose Maria de Zalvidea and built of heavy masonry sometime between 1810 and 1816 to serve Mission San Gabriel. Another gristmill was built nearer the mission and the old mill was gradually abandoned; it passed from mission control in 1846. It passed through many hands until 1903, when Henry E. Huntington bought the building and restored it to its former proportions.
