OAK OF THE GOLDEN DREAM - 6 Mi. E of Newhall, "In March 1842, Francisco Lopez y Arbllo, while gathering wild onions from around an old oak in Placerita Canyon, discovered gold particles clinging to the roots of the bulbs. It is estimated that \$80,000 in gold was recovered as a result of this discovery.

PIONEER OIL REFINERY - 0.5 mi E of Newhall (Pico Canyon). In 1875 the Star Oil Company, one of the predessors of the Standard Oil Co., drilled its first well, which yielded about one hundred barrels per day. The discovery resulted in the erection of the first commercial oil refinery in California the following year.

ST FRANCIS DAM DISASTER SITE - 32300 N. San Francisquito Canyon Rd., Saugus. The 185-foot concrete St. Francis Dam, part of the L.A. aqueduct system, stood a mile and a half north of this spot. On March 12, 1928, just before midnight, it collapsed and sent over 12 billion gallons of water roaring down the valley of the Santa Clara River. Over 450 lives were lost in this one of California's greatest disasters.

SITE OF LLANO DEL RIO COOPERATIVE COLONY - 4.5 Mi E. of Pearblossom on Hwy 138. This was the site of the most important nonreligious utopian experiment in Western American history. At its height, in 1916, it had a tousand members dedicated to the principle of cooperation rather than that of competition. Its founder, Job Harriman, was Eugene Deb's running mate in the presidential election of 1900 and became an influetial Socialist leader; in 1911 he was almost elected mayor of L.A.

LANG - Lang Station Rd adjacent to Southern Pacific tracks in Soledad Cyn. On September 5, 1876 Charles Crocker, President of the Southern Pacific Company, drove a gold spike here to complete his company's San Joaquin Valley line, the first rail connection of Los Angeles with San Francisco and the transcontinental lines.
