ROGER L. MAYER TO RECEIVE FIRST "HEART OF SCREENLAND STAR" AWARD

PRESENTATION AT GALA FILM PREMIERE MOVED TO SEPTEMBER 24TH

"Wizard of Oz" 60TH ANNIVERSARY TRIBUTE RECALLS SWEET MEMORIES

Dorothy and Toto narrowly escaped the Wicked Witch - again - and each told their "side" of the story to the delighted crowd who attended the Wizard of Oz 60th Anniversary Tribute held on Sunday, June 6 at the Sagebrush Cantina in downtown Culver City to benefit the Culver City Historical Museum.

While the beloved film classic will be celebrated throughout the world during 1999, none will be more appropriate than this tribute held in Culver City, the "Heart of Screenland"- the city where

the film was created in 1939.

It was an afternoon dedicated to the spirit and joy of L. Frank Baum's immortal tale, with families and friends sharing in the fun of costume contests, raffle prizes, silent auctions and the chance to meet "Dorothy" and the "Wicked Witch" in person. TURNER ENTERTAINMENT COO FIRST RECIPIENT OF SOCIETY'S AWARD

The Board of the Culver City Historical Society has named Roger L. Mayer as the first recipient of the "Heart of Screenland Star" Award for his long career and personal interest in the art of film and its preservation, and for his support of community organizations such as the Culver City Historical Society.

The Society has created the "Heart of Screenland Star Award" to honor and thank those individuals who have contributed to the Culver City community and the Culver City Historical Society in a significant way through their work and support to further the preservation of the history of Culver City. This award will be bestowed on civic and business leaders, filmmakers, artisans, and prominent volunteers, among others.

Mr. Mayer has been President and Chief Operating Officer of Turner Entertainment Company since August, 1986. Before joining TEC, he began a twenty-five year career with Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, progressing from Assistant General Manager of the studio (Cont'd page 3) "Culver City: The Reel Hollywood" Premiere to Benefit Museum Campaign

Many years have gone into the making of Culver City: The Reel Hollywood. In this fourpart documentary, Producer-Director Ross Hawkins, with dedication and perseverance, has filmed wonderful interviews and obtained rare historical information, footage and photographs to tell the important story of the nearly 85-year history of the entertainment industry in the "Heart of Screenland."

On Friday, September 24th, Part I, "Visions of Grandeur," will have its public premiere at the Veterans Memorial Building in Culver City. This will be an old-fashioned gala premiere with stars, klieg lights and well-dressed "first-nighters" attending to benefit the Culver City Historical Museum Campaign.

Hawkins' quest led to many Culver City residents, young and old, who told him personal stories and historical accounts that he used in the body of the film. With the expertise of Culver City and motion picture historians, a picture of the City's growth and development comes to life, giving the viewer a sense of the City's history as well as the people who created it and made it prosper over the years.

Harry Culver creates a new city

Culver City's history begins with real estate entrepreneur Harry Culver beginning to develop the area with the help of the early motion picture industry in Los Angeles as its economic base. The most prominent of these film industry personalities was Thomas H. Ince who built the first major motion picture studio in the "new" Culver City in 1915 at 10202 W. Washington (Cont'd page 3)

Notes from Your City Historian by Julie Lugo Cerra



As the Honorary City Historian, I have a voicemail for historic inquiries. Please refer all inquiries to 310.253.6059. I will be checking it often.

In the spirit of sharing information:

- Did you know there was a tile manufacturer called the Valencia Spanish Tile Corp. on Elenda Street, just below Washington Boulevard in the 1930s? That teaser may become a future newsletter article by a tile historian who just purchased one of their tiles over the internet -- especially if we uncover more information to help him with his research.
- Do you remember a winery at Braddock and Elenda? It was called De Bartolo Winery. Must be the land -- Agustin Machado, the founder of Rancho La Ballona, was well-known for his white wine made from grapes in his vineyards.
- During the first week of September in 1781, 44 persons in 11 families with four soldiers proceeded the nine miles down what became the Los Angeles River from the San Gabriel Mission to establish the "Pueblo of Los Angeles." Descendants of those founders formed the "Los Pobladores 200" for the 200th birthday of the pueblo, and they make an annual trek to commem-

orate this walk by the early settlers. This year's event will take place on Saturday, Sept. 4, the city's actual founding date. The "pueblo" will mark its 218th birthday and the mission will turn 228!

- The Machado Reunion will be held on October 9 this year. If you are a descendent, you would really enjoy this event which is an incredible resource and social gathering. The descendants of Agustin and Ygnacio Machado and their friends bring the total beyond 300. In the spirit of the early settlers, there is traditional live music, dancing, and of course food and activities for the entire family.
- Fred Machado arranged for an original linen partition map, which defined land of Agustin Machado's descendants, to be donated to Loyola Marymount University. Although it is available for research there, Fred has made reproductions, with a written narrative about Rancho La Ballona. The map proceeds will go toward a marker for Agustin Machado's grave. The remains of Machado, his wife, Ramona and two of his sons, were moved from the little cemetery in Downtown Los Angeles to Calvary Cemetery in Whittier. The unmarked grave is now located at the Bernard family plot.

It is nice to see new faces at the Historical Society meetings, including Jim Lamm and Jonathan Weiss. Jim is heading the La Ballona Renaissance Program which offered an informative display at the Fiesta. REEL LIFE IN CULVER CITY

GIL PERKINS

On March 28th, my good friend and mentor, Gil Perkins passed away at the Motion Picture and Television Hospital in Woodland Hills. He was 91.


Gil came to this country from Australia in 1929. He began working as an actor at 20th Century Fox and appeared in the 1930 prison comedy, *Up the River*, directed by John Ford with Humphrey Bogart and Spencer Tracy.

In 1931, Gil began his successful career as a stuntman when he was asked to replace actor William Boyd's stunt double on a film being shot in Culver City. After seeing him dart across Culver Blvd. and climb the fire escape of the Culver Hotel during night filming, Boyd was so impressed that he hired Gil to work on his next three films.

He had to turn down the job of doubling for Boyd on the first of the "Hopalong Cassidy"

films in 1935 because he was set to sail for Tahiti with the cast and crew for second unit work on Mutiny on the Bounty.





In 1960, Gil helped found the Stuntmen's Association of Motion Pictures, Inc. and also served on the board of the Screen Actors Guild for 27 years.

In 1979, Gil helped to create the SAG Legacy Series in which distinguished actors and actresses are interviewed on videotape for historical documentation. I was fortunate to have worked as Associate Producer on the episodes with Henry Fonda and Eddie Albert. It allowed me to become good friends with Gil and fellow Australian actor, Edward Ashley.

In his retirement, Gil was an active member of the board of the Motion Picture Country Home and The Actors Emergency Relief Fund.

Gil Perkins was a man who lived the full, robust life of a movie stuntman, while maintaining a sweet, kindly nature an interested and interesting gentleman.

through a variety of executive positions, culminating as Senior Vice President of Administration and President of MGM Laboratories, Inc.

Mayer was born in New York City in 1926, and received his B.A. at Yale University and his L.L.B. and J.D. at Yale Law School.

It is in the field of film preservation that Mayer concentrates a good amount of his energies. He is a member of the National Film Preservation Board of the Library of Congress and Chairman of the National Film Preservation Foundation.


Mayer is Chairman of the Board of the Motion Picture and Television Fund and a Board Member of its Charitable Foundation. He is also on the Board of Governors of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences and on the Board of the Academy Foundation, as well as a member of the Los Angeles County Bar Association and the Los Angeles Copyright Society.

The inaugural "Heart of Screenland Star" Award will be presented to Mr. Mayor on Friday evening, September 24 at the gala premiere of "Visions of Grandeur" to benefit the Culver City Historical Museum campaign.

Christened Triangle-Thomas Ince Studios, it was here that several early silent screen stars such as Douglas Fairbanks and William S. Hart made their names.

The film tells how the studio was later taken over by other companies and, in 1924, by the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer merger. After leaving Triangle, Ince built a second major studio in 1918, just 1/4 mile further east on Washington Blvd. There he produced several successful films and developed the filmmaking process into a highly professional formula, later becoming known as the father of the modern shooting script.



After Ince's death in 1924, Cecil B. DeMille took over his studio in 1925 and made many notable films there including one of his greatest, *The King of Kings*, in 1927. Later on this lot such film classics as *King Kong*, *Gone With the Wind*, and *Citizen Kane* were filmed.

Culver City: The Reel Hollywood is highly informative and entertaining.
