

REEL COULVER CITY

THE ROYMANE STUDIOS OF CULVER CITY

One of the forgotten small motion picture studios that once existed in the early days of Culver City was the Romayne Super Film Company owned by Henry Y. Romayne.

Located on the northeast corner of Washington Boulevard and what is now Ince Boulevard, the film company was formed in July of 1918 to produce five- and six-reel features for independent release.

Betty Burbank was the company's first leading actress with Josephine Crowell playing supporting roles. Wyndham Gettins was the director general of the first film, *Me und Gott*, produced in a studio in Hollywood.

SETTLED IN CULVER CITY IN 1919

The Romayne Company settled in Culver City, building a two-story administration building and one large open stage and a backlot in 1919. Before Romayne could start using its own studio, Jack Warner leased the new studio to produce one of his early two-reel comedies with his popular comedy star, Monty Banks.

By May of the same year, Romayne produced *The Sagebrush League* starring Myrta Sterling. It was followed with other films into the 1920s such as *King Cole, Mary Minds Her Business* and *The Torreador* to name a few. Among their brightest stars between 1919 and 1921 included John Hayes, Myrta Sterling, Vera Sisson and Edward Hearn. Their directors included George Sergeant, Harry Gant, Fred Jefferson and Harry Edwards.

In 1920, the company decided to produce both big feature films and short comedies. When G.F. Thew of London, England, purchased a controlling interest in the Super Film Company, he and his son Eric enlarged the stage area in Culver City

for more production space. Romayne secured the release of its pictures with the Western Exploitation company headed by Sol Lesser.

By 1921, the company had produced three one-reel situation comedy pictures entitled, *Crossed Wires, Perfect Thirty Six* and *Dear Hunting*, all directed by Harry Edwards.


At about this time, most of the Romayne productions were winding down and the Romayne Studios in Culver City were being used more as an annex by the Thomas Ince Studios which was situated across the street

(today known as the Culver Studios).

By 1926, the old Romayne Studio became known as "The Studio Hotel" at 9099 Washington Boulevard, catering to motion picture professionals who worked at the studios nearby. The hotel operated well into the 1940s and was eventually replaced by Bill Murphy Buick which became a well-known Culver City landmark into the 1990s.

# A FOND LOOK BACK AT A CULVER CITY LANDMARK:

# STELLAR HARDWARE ON MAIN STREET

Didn't you just love to walk to Main Street when you were a kid? For so many of us, it was just our size – we knew all the stores, many of the owners, and our parents were comfortable sending us to shop. This year, we sadly lost the last of the old-time stores.

Until 2008, the longest standing retailer on Main Street was established in 1923 as Steller Bros. & Skoog. The original owners were Adolph W. and Herman A. Steller and John L. Skoog. Adolph Steller presided over the Chamber of Commerce during the development of the Hayden Tract, the first industrial tract in Culver City. Steller pro-actively marketed it in the mid-1940s, which explains the street carrying his name.

The original addresses on Main Street were numbered in the 7000s, with the early Steller Bros. & Skoog listed at 7024. As Culver City developed, it was laid out south of Venice Boulevard, but in many locations the boundaries are mid-block. Main Street is one of those streets and the early store was just "across the alley," north of their current location. That store actually had a Bagley address in Los Angeles!

After World War II, then store bookkeeper, Caryll Wild, and Jim Bohn purchased the store. The name changed to "Stellar" Hardware. Caryll Wild and his wife, Marguerite, continued the tradition of active participation in the community. In 1968, a young Navy pilot, Rob Barber, married their daughter Jan, and in 1972, her sister, Charlyn, married youthful high school shop teacher, Jack Barton. In 1973, Rob and Jack, the brothers-in-law, bought the hardware store and continued to foster the casual home-town hardware store atmosphere.

Rob and Jack both cite their most memorable day in business as one in 1994, when they came to work after the Northridge earthquake. They found the windows broken out and two thirds of their stock on the floor. That day, many of their long time customers showed up in overalls to help. Others were so thankful they were open, they arrived with turkey and ham to feed the employees! Rob called it "the most gratifying day ever."

In keeping with our "Heart of Screenland" history, Rob and Jack fought their first impulse to paint Marilyn Monroe on the back of the store. Greatly loved Laurel and Hardy won out and the huge mural was painted with Stan and Ollie – in overalls, of course!

When prompted, Jack told me their most unusual sale was a request from Larry Flynt Publications, which needed eight 5-gallon barrels/cans immediately. The store had no empties, so Jack and Rob stuck a sign in the window offering free paint thinner and kerosene if you brought your own container. They emptied the cans for happy

customers and Larry Flynt got his barrels for a pontoontype boat to float a lady in a photo shoot.....!

"The boys in bermuda shorts" – Lion Jack and Rotarian Rob – closed their doors, but vowed to remain a presence in Culver City. So, stop and say "hi" if you see them learning to sit and drink coffee!


I want to take this opportunity to thank Karla for her hard work and wish her all the very best for a successful and fulfilling future in her chosen field.

#### **MGM CATALOGUE FROM 1970**

Among our wonderful collection of memorabilia and reference materials is a rare catalogue from the 1970 auction of MGM items from its long and star-studded history. It was truly the end of an era of a film studio that was such an integral part of Culver City's own history.

This catalogue is from the famous MGM auction, 38 years ago. This was the public auction from which the costume collection came which is now housed at the ARC.

It was also the auction that "rediscovered" Dorothy's ruby slippers from The Wizard of Oz, amongst other treasures, and was held over a number of days in various stages on the lot which is




# An ARC Update .....

# OUR "ARC" IS UP & RUNNING!

While it continues to make progress, we are now open to our members and the community on the first and third Saturdays of the month from 1 pm to 3 pm, and also by appointment. So, please come by.

April's CCHS General Meeting featured Leith Adams, Chief Archivist at the Warner Bros. Museum, as our guest speaker. His presentation on "The Art of Archiving" was so very interesting and informative.



Leith spoke of being a "bone collector" – collecting everything while trying to throw the "crap" away! And it's not always easy to know what historians and archivists may need in the future, though he tries to reassess the collection every five years.

Leith first came in contact with the Warner Bros. "documented" history while attending USC where he was hired in the cataloging of the WB Collection (documents & photos). The collection was donated to the School of Cinema-Television at USC in 1977.

While he personally collects movie posters, the Warner Bros. collection he oversees includes all kinds of memorabilia, including movie sets, marketing programs, written and acting scripts, and other ancillary items relating to all the arts of filmmaking.

The archives are meant to bring the process of making a film and the people involved to life for today's audiences. He cited such items as letters from Ronald Reagan and Bette Davis to Jack Warner as wonderful "stories" of their times.

After a lively question-and-answer session, the ARC was opened for all in attendance to visit – and we received many positive comments.

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Our Historical Society observed Historical Preservation Month early in May with a festive event that took place at the Culver Hotel and in the suite that was once Harry Culver's office. Many Culver residents attended the May 2nd event.

One of those people was Mike Castleman who brought his young son, Logan, who showed so much interest in our Historical Society and asked questions of all of us. When he went back to school at Linwood Howe Elementary, he reported what he had learned to his third-grade teacher, Coco Kita. She, in turn, told the other three third-grade teachers what she had learned from Logan. All the teachers thought it would be fitting to arrange a field trip to our ARC. Stuart Freeman, our President, and Julie Lugo Cerra, our Historian, offered to arrange it as soon as possible.

Each class was divided in half. One group came into the ARC for a Power Point presentation by Julie which showed the history of Culver City. Meanwhile, the other group was taken on a tour led by Stu Freeman, Carol Gustin, and Cathy Zermeno of the Veterans' Building and the historic markers surrounding it. Then, both groups changed places.

Having students and community people visit makes our ARC so worthwhile. It is our aim and hope to have more events like these on a continuing basis.

RESEARCH & CATALOGING CONTINUES

Costume Chair Louise Coffey-Webb and her intern Karen Contreras having been working tirelessly, readying the exhibit of the costumes we have. With the assistance of film historian and CCHS member Marc Wanamaker, they have made wonderful progress in identifying the "what/who/when" of these vintage treasures.
