
happy that you did!

A GREAT 2009 AHEAD!

This new year of 2009 is going to be filled with celebrations!

First, it marks the 70th Anniversary of several 1939 classic films. Do you remember the beautiful stamps to commemorate some of those films? In 1990, The Culver Studios hosted an event in Culver City for which the CC Post Office even arranged a local cancellation! (see photo below)



Also, it marks the 90th Anniversary of the opening of Thomas Ince's second studio, currently The Culver Studios (at 9336 Washington Blvd.), and The Hal Roach Studios - known as the "laugh factory to the world" - which was further east on Washington Blvd. and now remembered with an historical marker at the corner of National Blvd. placed by Sons of the Desert International Laurel & Hardy Society).

The Academy of Motion Pictures Art and Sciences will be hosting another great film series in 2009. Haberkamp, Program Director of the Academy Foundation, tells us it will start in the spring. The ten-film series will feature 1939 film releases, including The Wizard of Oz and Gone With the Wind, which will bookend the event.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION **OBJECTIVES**

Historic Preservation is front and center.....and concern is warranted. We will let you know when the proposed new Historic Preservation Ordinance will go to Council and the RFP (Request for Proposal) for a new historic survey.

We marked the Legion Building as Historic Site #5 in 1985, and it is a part of the property that Brotman Medical Center wishes to sell. It holds "significant" historic status in Culver City.

REEL COLVER CITY

CULVER CITY'S MERALTA THEATRE

The traveling female duo of 'The large' Pearl Merrill and 'The Tiny' Laura Peralta performed as "Ella Fant and Miss Kito" on the vaudeville circuit for many years, accumulating enough money to build their own theatre at 9632 Culver Boulevard, Culver City.

FILM PREVIEWS LEADS TO FIRST-RUN RELEASES

The Meralta's opening premiere show included an appearance by Will Rogers, a new Thomas Ince film and an *Our Gang* comedy (which had all the kids leaping through their on-screen likeness when the projectionist stopped the film!). The duo then began to book other vaudeville acts at the new theatre, and the first was a review titled *Half A Dollar Bill* with Sherwood Wertz at the organ.

By 1927, the theatre was being used by local studios as a preview house for motion pictures and civic events. On May 27, 1927, MGM Studios hosted their sales convention in Los Angeles and arranged for their guests to see Lon Chaney's latest film, *The Unknown*. By 1928, MGM was using the theatre not just for its previews, but also for its general releases such as Beatrice Fairfax's *The Lovelorn* starring Sally O'Neil and Molly O'Day (see photo). And, by 1929, the theatre was being used on its "dark days" for Christian Science lectures.

On January 20, 1935, the Los Angeles Times announced that "The Meralta Theatre, at 9628 Culver Boulevard will be remodeled at a cost of \$10,000, according to architect C. A. Balch." The newly-remodeled theatre joined the Fox West Coast Theatre chain and began to show first run films.

In 1938, a typical film program included such fare as *Holiday* starring Katharine Hepburn and Cary Grant, *Three Comrades* starring Robert Taylor and Franchot Tone, and *The Saint in New York* with Louis Hayward.

1940s: War-Themed Films

During World War II, the theatre was screening war-themed films such as

Fighting Chetniks and Noel Coward's In Which We Serve. Five Graves To Cairo, starring Erich Von Stroheim, screened in August of 1943.

On August 10th, the Los Angeles Times reported: "Unscheduled Performance! Fire, which is believed to have started in a theater lobby, early yesterday, swept through a Culver City building housing a theatre [Meralta] and small shops at an estimated loss of \$100,000." The devastated theatre was moved to the Culver Auditorium the following year until a new building could be built. Sometime around the end of 1945, a new theatre was built on the original site.

A NEW ERA

After Pearl Merrill's death in 1961, Laura Peralta Brackett remained in her apartment over the theatre, constructed so she could watch the films from a special room. At this time, *The Grass Is Greener*, starring Cary Grant opened at the theatre.

In 1969, the theatre was hosting studio previews and fundraiser parties for local schools and colleges. During the 1970s, the theatre suffered some vandalism and became run-down.

On February 24, 1983, the Los Angeles Times announced that "Culver Rebuilds \$4 Million Dollar Plaza on the old Meralta Theatre site is the first major development in Culver City in many years." On June 3, 1984, the new Meralta Office Plaza (a Spanish-style office complex at 9696 Culver Blvd.) opened and was the first major public development in over two decades.

2008 ~ A YEAR IN REVIEW

2008 began with an Installation-Dinner on January 16th of the Society's 11th president, Stu Freeman.

NEWS FROM THE COSTUME CHAIR...

GENE KELLY'S "CANDY CANE" JACKET

In honor of the season's holidays, we have on display at the ARC the actual "candy cane" jacket worn by Gene Kelly in the musical *Take Me Out to the Ball Game*, 1949, directed by Busby Berkeley. Kelly played Eddie O'Brien and starred along with Frank Sinatra and Esther Williams.

The men's costumes were designed by a gentleman who just went by one name: Valles. His full name was J. Arlington Valles and he worked at MGM for two decades, winning a costume Oscar ® along with Bill Thomas for *Spartacus*. He specialized in men's costumes (Helen Rose did the women's costumes in this film) and he was an excellent costume illustrator.

As you can see by the close-ups in the photos, the jacket is in very fine condition for being 60 years old and, rather than a woven red stripe, it is actually achieved with applied chain-stitched yarn! See how the lines match up so beautifully - a mark of true tailoring. The jacket is fully lined and the inside pocket bears the usual Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer label with Kelly's name and a production number. This is typical of labels used in all MGM wardrobe at that time.

The current display features a man's torso with a carved wooden base, which was donated by my dear friends, the artists Pamela and Gregory Weir-Quiton.

noted that an independent study done this millennium, found the structure worthy of National Register status.

The Gateway Station Post Office was built in 1940, during the tenure of Culver City's postmaster Paul Jarrett. There is some speculation on the naming of the facility. CCHS member Steve Newton recalled that his father, who worked for the U.S. Post Office, remembered Jarrett telling the employees in 1946 that it was the "Gateway to the Stars." Jarrett, who was decorated for his war service with a U.S. Purple Heart and by France with its Legion of Honor medal, served as the City Clerk in Culver City from 1928 to 1939, and Postmaster for the following twenty years.

BUILT IN THE MODERNE STYLE

According to the survey of historic structures compiled by 30th Street Architects in 1987 and which was adopted by the City Council in its final form in 1991, Gateway Station Post Office was given "Recognition" status.

The Gateway Station, located at 9942 Culver Boulevard, is described as "Moderne" in style, "is 11/2 stories high, with a symmetrical façade and a flat roof, bordered with a rounded ledge. The center of interest is the wide, recessed, entry porch on the

north side. Four rounded columns, with banded caps, support the ceiling. Metal-framed, multi-paned glass panels, which run from floor to ceiling, cover the entire surface of the back wall of the porch. A pair of metal-framed doors in the center lead to the lobby. A pair of very large and unusual metal and opaque glass lanterns are placed on the concrete piers on each side of the steps. Matching round columns, in recessed sections add interest to both the east and west sides of the building." (from the 1990 HPAC Report)

A GEORGE SAMERJAN LOBBY MURAL

Although Culver City's Historic Preservation ordinance has focused on the outside of structures, there is some interesting history within the building as well. There was a congressional office off the lobby and over the entrance to that office is a 1941 mural by George Samerjan.

From an internet search, it appears that Samerjan was born in Boston in 1915. He is listed as faculty at Occidental College in Los Angeles in 1940. He served as a documentary artist for the U.S. Air Force in the Arctic and other locations and he worked for the Los Angeles Times as an art director. He also taught art at New York University for 25 years.

Samerjan is credited with the design of three U.S. postage stamps, commemorating the Arctic, the Erie Canal and Adlai Stevenson. Samerjan's other post office murals included one in Maywood, CA which was destroyed, and one in Calexico, Mexico.

The mural in the Gateway Station is titled "Studio Lot." It is a twelve foot by ten foot mural depicting empty movie sets on an MGM back lot.

Culver City's Community Development Department is aware of the property's availability and is looking for a good use for this historic structure. The CC Historical Society copied its comment letter to the City to keep Cultural Affairs and Community Development in the loop as plans for this unique building move forward.

GUEST SPEAKERS PROFILE:

THE PARRISH FAMILY

Having actor Clark Gable as a pal back in Akron, OH was the start of the fascinating journey of Jim Parrish who began a three-generational tale of a Culver City family and the movies!

At the urging of Gable, Parrish came to Culver City and started out as an actor, but didn't like it much. Gable then got him into the Props. Dept. at MGM. While on location in Catalina for the star-studded classic film, *Mutiny on the Bounty*, his son Dennis was born in 1935.

In 1953, Dennis followed his dad into the world of the Property Master, working on movies all over the world – and taking his family with him! He founded The Hand Prop Room in 1974.

After a chance meeting at George Denton's 76 Gas Station, Dennis met and married his wife Wilma in 1957 in the old St. Augustine Church, having their reception at the Veterans Memorial Building. Daughter Hope was born in 1958, attended Culver schools, graduating in the Class of '76 (mom "Willy" was Class of '54!).

Traveling the world over with her dad, Hope, too, got the family "Prop. bug" and eventually became official in 1979, working at Universal Studios. Her credits include "Cagney and Lacey," "China Beach," The Net, Jerry Maguire, Air Force One, and the list continues! [Note: Both Dennis and Hope have often worked with CCHS newsletter Editor Judy Stangler's family who handle the Special Effects (physical) side of production.]

And, grandson Ryan Gullixson is on his way to becoming the 4th generation of Culver City "Property Masters!"

Hosted by the USC Libraries and building on the USC Libraries' commitment to preserving Southern California and Los Angeles history, L.A. as Subject is developing a variety of new resources to support L.A.-area historical collections and strengthen the involvement of local communities. It aims to raise public interest in local history while providing opportunities for educators, community archivists, librarians, and historians to share ideas and help one another preserve the L.A. region's diverse cultural heritage.

L.A. as Subject is working to increase the visibility of local archives and improve access to them for students, researchers, K-12 educators, and everyone else with a
